2. **Mixing** all the ingredients of the gingerbread batter
3. **Baking** the gingerbread
4. **Baking** the gingerbread
5. **Smelling** the delicious scent of the spices

6. **sneaking** a piece
7. **cutting** the hard, flat bread into rectangles
8. **gluing** the walls and candy pieces together
9. **Spreading** icing along the edges of the walls and roof
10. **putting** the house together

12. **Attaching** the candy pieces onto the gingerbread house
