A pronoun can take the place of a subject or an object in a sentence. **Subject pronouns** include *I, he, she, we, and they*. (Subject pronouns are said to be in the nominative case.) **Object pronouns** can be used after an action verb or a preposition. Object pronouns include *me, him, her, us, and them*. (Object pronouns are said to be in the objective case.) The pronouns *it* and *you* can be either subjects or objects.



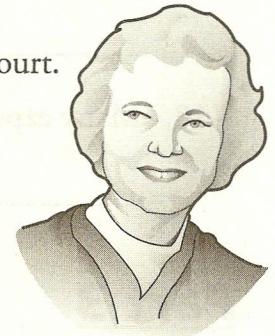
